"General Lee" & Dillinger Car from *Public*Enemies Headline Historic Mitchell Street Classic Car Show

Family-friendly free event is this Sunday, September 19, between 10 a.m. and 3 p.m.

Residents can enjoy a few blocks' worth of classic cars, take in performances by two highly-regarded Mexican dance groups, and sample a variety of foods at Sunday's 3rd Annual Historic Mitchell Street Classic Car Show, **Alderman Jim Witkowiak said.**

The non-alcohol, free event will take place on W. Historic Mitchell St. between S. 7th and S. 11th streets, with showcase judging at 930 W. Historic Mitchell St.

Sure to attract classic car buffs will be the "General Lee," the super fast 1969 Dodge Charger seen flying through the deep-south back roads in the early 1980s television show "The Dukes of Hazzard." Also, the black Ford Model A coupe used as the John Dillinger getaway car in the film *Public Enemies*, will also be featured at the show.

Sponsored by the **Mitchell Street Business Improvement District #4**, this year's classic car show will salute Mexican Independence Day, and will include two afternoon performances by the Ballet Folklorico Mexico and the Academia de Danza Mexico, both headquartered on Historic Mitchell St.

Alderman Witkowiak said the event offers "a family-friendly time for people of all ages." "It's also a great opportunity to check out the variety of shops, restaurants and stores on Historic Mitchell Street, and to see what a tremendous urban shopping area it truly is," he said.
